## Medical quiz: images

## Munshi Aa, Islam MRb

A 55-year-old non-diabetic, normotensive patient presented with sudden, severe, dull aching headache associated with right sided partial ptosis and horizontal diplopia. His headache was more pronounced on right side of head. It was not associated with dimness of vision, chemosis of eye, vomiting, speech difficulties, weakness or numbness of limbs, bowel or bladder dysfunction or fever. On examination, he was anxious

and ill looking. His blood pressure was 90/60 mm of Hg with tachycardia and small volume pulse. He had right sided 3<sup>rd</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> nerve palsy with mild asymmetry of pupil size. Examination of other systems revealed no abnormalities. His serum sodium level was 116 mmol/l. Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) of the brain (Figure

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
